



Regional Exports by Destination Zones by Industry Sector^
















UNEMPLOYMENT RATE DURING COVID-19

In Frankston, prior to COVID-19 and the introduction of lockdown measures to manage the pandemic, total employment across all local industry sectors was estimated at 44,934 jobs. For September 2020, total employment was estimated at 43,274 jobs, a fall of 3.7%. However, in December 2020, total employment is estimated to have increased to 44,359, meaning a fall of 1.3% since the start of the pandemic.












Frankston City Centre Vacancy Rates* Updated January 2021


