Council grants still up for grabs three new categories announced

We have many grants still available for individuals and community groups in the 2018-2019 Financial Year, including three new categories:

"Council offers residents a pool of funding worth more than \$110,000 each year for community and miscellaneous grants, to help them reach their goals as individuals and as community members. Our grant program is a great way to support a

project or idea that can help many others in the community, and I encourage everyone to take a look at what's on offer," says Frankston City Mayor, Cr Michael O'Reilly.

"Many residents may be unaware they still have a chance to apply for funding this financial year. Of course, if you do miss out, applications for the next round of funding will open in July," says Cr O'Reilly.

A funding boost for local mental health services

Kindred Clubhouse Inc. is a notfor-profit organisation supporting individuals with mental illness to access a safe and welcoming space. Late last year, Kindred Clubhouse received a \$1,000 Community grant from Council to help offset the operating costs for its program.

Kindred Clubhouse Manager, Kim Kerr, says the grant has been invaluable in helping the organisation to operate its social program held each Saturday at the Ebdale Community Hub.

"Until recently the Kindred Clubhouse has relied on funding from Council and from Frankston Rotary 2.0 in order to 'stay afloat'," Mr Kerr said "The clubhouse program is a team approach and it is vitally important that the members gain a sense of inclusion and of being valued. The support from Council has been invaluable in helping us to establish our program."

The organisation is based in Frankston and works on the evidence-based 'Clubhouse' model —proven to help

restore mental health. Clubhouse programs offer people with a mental illness a place that is supportive and where they feel accepted. Kindred Clubhouse also links people with peers who can relate to their challenges and access to related services.

"One of the most significant ways that we can make an important impact on the lives of people with a mental illness — is for them to experience being needed. Typically, people with a mental illness will often feel no one needs them or looks forward to having them around," says Mr Kerr. A competitive edge for local business

As Frankston City continues to grow, it is important for businesses to change in line with the landscape. The street frontage of any business is a calling card to customers. It ideally should be integrated with the streetscape, inspiring, comfortable and inviting.

Council currently has two grant programs open to businesses in the city centre; the Façade Improvement Program and round two of the Kerbside Trading Grants.

Both grants encourage creative possibilities that could include elements of the following:

- Greening and planter boxes.
- Interaction with the street. e.g servery windows or bifold doors
- Elements of sustainability or natural materials e.g wood panelling
- Attractive detail, such as texture or artistic features, innovative materials or unique furniture.
- Weather protection elements and awnings. e.g umbrellas, canopies.
- Complimentary colour schemes for furniture and fixtures

The Façade Improvement Program helps to encourage business owners, operators and landlords in the city centre to enhance the presentation of their building. In partnership with the Victorian Government, grants of up to



\$5,000 will be issued to eligible businesses or building owners for repainting, green walls, innovative details or artist work, signage improvements and other shopfront enhancement.

Kerbside Trading Grants help to brighten and stimulate the city centre, by activating the streets with increased alfresco outdoor dining activity. Grants of \$2,000 each will be issued to food and drink businesses in the city centre with funding provided by the Victorian Government.

haven't done this before. People often don't realise when we go to an event just how much hard work has gone into ensuring the event is a success," says Frankston City Council Event Coordinator, Jessica Schuyler.

"Frankston City is such a wonderful spot to host an event, we wanted to make sure community groups were aware Council offers so much support to hosts, including the Major Local Community Event Grant." Is yours the Best Street in Frankston City?

Our Best Street Award Program is about to launch, aimed at empowering communities to work together to improve their properties and streets.

We are asking residents to start thinking about what makes their street friendly, how they look out for each other's wellbeing, how presentable, tidy and accessible their street and properties are, as well as how their street creates community connections.

Creating a sense of local pride with better presented streets and homes can have a positive knock on effect and create a support network proven to be good for mental health. Neighbours will need to nominate a representative from their street, to help keep everyone informed and engaged throughout the program. You can nominate your street representative now online or fill out a form at one of our Customer Service Centres.

A panel of judges, including Councillors, Council staff and external agencies will determine the winning streets, which will be announced at the next Waterfront Festival. Street nominations will open later in the year, so keep an eye on the Council website. More information on the program will be available in the coming weeks.



Supporting parents to connect with their community

Our FREE Supported Playgroups are a safe and friendly place for eligible families to have fun, while receiving parenting tips and support. Qualified early learning professionals run weekly sessions during term-time, with morning tea provided.

Supported playgroups are a great way to meet other families in your local area and one on one in-home support is also available for eligible families. The playgroups are offered in many locations across the City, and are supported by the Department of Education and Training.

"The main aim of the playgroup is to build parent and carer confidence in supporting their child's learning during play and everyday experiences. We are also a great resource to link families to other services in their community," says Supported Playgroup Facilitator, Emma Hull.

The groups have been very well received amongst parents and carers, with one parent from a recent Kananook Preschool session noting, "The interaction between not only the kids but the parents is great. It's so nice to have the social time together; to compare stories and hear advice from people going through the same stage of parenting, or thereabouts, as you are."

"Worried she'd need to wait another day to get advice, she then remembered Councils' MCH service at Terry White. The mother said the MCH nurse was very patient, didn't rush them and explained everything very well, says Joanne. This mum went on to say, "The MCH nurse is worth her weight in gold!"

MCH services promote the health and wellbeing of children from birth to six years of age. Services include, breastfeeding and nutrition support, sleep and settling, child behaviour guidance, immunisation and access other related support services.

Annual hard waste collection now underway

Our annual hard waste collection is making its way across Frankston City.

If we haven't already stopped by your place yet, check 'My Address' on the Council website to see when we'll head to your street. You will also receive a brochure in the mail, notifying you two weeks before collection starts in your area. Please remember, placing hard waste out early is considered illegal dumping and penalties apply. You may place your rubbish out no earlier than the Saturday two days prior to your collection week starting. It is also illegal to disturb neighbours' collections, including removing items. If your hard waste has already been collected, you may have noticed it was not all taken at once, but in

stages. Often, goods are collected by two or three different trucks, depending on the type of waste and taken to different centres for recycling. For example, whitegoods such as refrigerators are processed differently to mattresses or bundled green waste. Don't worry if your collection is only partially collected, it will be taken in full over a period of days.

We would like to thank residents for their patience with the delay to this year's service and to acknowledge the excellent level of compliance with our collection regulations to date. nbn™ rolling out across Frankston City

The rollout of nbn™ in Frankston City is well advanced, with all households and businesses to be fully connected by July 2019.

The nbn™ is not just limited to services requiring internet connection but will also impact items using the traditional landline connection, including phones, medical alarms, auto diallers and emergency call buttons, fire alarms, Eftpos terminals and lift phones. Unmonitored medical alarm users may be eligible to upgrade to a new unmonitored medical alarm device through a participating device supplier at a reduced cost. As most existing landline phone and internet

services will be disconnected, it's important you switch affected services even if you only use a landline phone.

What you need to do

If you haven't already, now is the time to contact your retailer about switching your phone and internet services to nbn™. You will be notified by mail once your home or business is nbn™ ready, you can then contact a phone and internet provider/retailer to make the switch. To continue transforming Frankston City into the Lifestyle Capital of Victoria we need to continually invest in infrastructure and services to support our growing community.


Council is committed to ensuring the best possible outcomes for our residents and visitors, with the following projects identified by Council as a priority for Federal and Victorian Governments to invest in.



REVITALISING OUR CITY CENTRE

There are a number of priority projects that will help deliver responses to the challenges of population growth and sustainability as part of Frankston City's ongoing revitalisation, these include:

- Electrification of the Stony Point line from Frankston to Hastings
- Car parking solutions (including the rail electrification)
- Smart City initiatives such as intelligent bins and smart parking apps
- Creation of a health, education and research precinct
- City centre renewal, including the alignment of government services in a central location (catalyst development)
- Delivering these combined projects will enhance Frankston City's reputation as the Lifestyle Capital of Victoria and as a hub for employment, health and education in the south east Melbourne and Mornington Peninsula regions.
- Both major parties have a program that would deliver these combined projects for the city.




EASING CAR PARKING CONGESTION AT FRANKSTON STATION

Currently, train commuters are battling to find a car parking space at Frankston Station and often have to arrive before 7am or travel further up the line to catch a train. Electrifying the Stony Point line from Frankston to Hastings will free up more spaces for locals, at Frankston, Kananook and Seaford Stations.

Additionally, the Victorian Government and Federal Opposition have promised to deliver a new \$17.5 million multi-story 500 space car park at Frankston Station. Council will advocate for both levels of government to ensure this vital infrastructure is delivered to our growing community. Additional car parking opportunities will open up at stations further along the rail line with the electrification of the existing Stony Point line from Frankston to Hastings, such as commuter car parking at a new Langwarrin Station.





INTEGRATED REGIONAL HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES

Improving the availability and accessibility of facilities and programs to support mental health and drug and alcohol dependent clients in the region is a priority of Council and local organisations, including Peninsula Health, Monash University Peninsula Campus and Frankston Private Hospital.

The Victorian Government has promised \$562 million towards the Frankston Hospital (Peninsula Health) expansion that will help deliver on this, including 12 new hospital beds, 13 new emergency department beds, mental health beds and more.

The Federal Government and Federal Opposition have also highlighted their support in the lead up to the 2019 federal election of a Health Futures Hub within Frankston's Health and Education Precinct.

This innovative research hub is a partnership between Monash University Peninsula Campus and Peninsula Health aimed at improving services and outcomes for clients.

ELECTRIFYING THE STONY POINT LINE FROM FRANKSTON

With a growing population of 305,000 residents, the region boasts a Metropolitan Activity Centre (Frankston) and a Major Activity Centre (Hastings) forming focal points for services, employment, housing and social interaction.

Frankston City Council and Mornington Peninsula Shire Council have worked together on a joint position supporting the vital electrification of the rail line to Hastings, with a staged approach to include Frankston to Langwarrin as stage one and Langwarrin to Hastings as stage two.

The electrification of the existing Stony Point line, including the relocation of Leawarra Station within Frankston's Health and Education Precinct, a new Langwarrin Station and station upgrades across the line with park and ride facilities will:

- Significantly increase commuter car parking along the line, reducing congestion at Frankston Station as well as alleviating pressure at Kananook and Seaford Stations
- Deliver metro services within reach of an additional 30,000 residents from Frankston to Langwarrin alone
- Provide an increased frequency of metro services for residents and visitors from the Mornington Peninsula to Melbourne.



We have all enjoyed spending time outdoors with our BFFs (Best Furry Friends) this past summer and of course our dogs don't stop needing walks and play time just because the weather turns cold. For those of you planning to brave the chilly weather in the coming months, it is important to remember there are some public places in Frankston City where pets must remain on-lead or where pets are not permitted. We have over 30 free roam areas across the city where dogs are allowed to run off-leash under supervision. There are also a number of spots where it is not appropriate to bring pets due to safety and hygiene concerns, including parts of Frankston's city centre. Likewise we need to keep cats and dogs away from certain reserves and gardens because of the risk posed to native flora and fauna. Please pick up after your dogs and always ensure you are considerate of others.

Two long-awaited projects making our streets safer

I am excited about the recent completion of works on Valley Road, Langwarrin. Improvements included construction of a sealed road pavement, sealed shoulders, traffic slow points such as chicanes, minor drainage and street lighting. Likewise, work has started to create a brand new concrete shared path for walkers to enjoy along McClelland Drive, between Centenary Park Drive and Darnley Drive, Langwarrin. This will complement the area of asphalt path between Skye Road roundabout and McClelland Sculpture Park+Gallery recently replaced with concrete.

These two projects address potentially dangerous spots for local pedestrians and drivers, while creating a brand new amenity. The existing pathway along McClelland Drive was particularly concerning, broken asphalt and gaps in the path were dangerous for walkers, especially those with small children, prams and pets as well as the elderly. I am excited this problematic area of

pathway has not only been corrected, but the pathway will also be extended.

Supporting men's mental health

It was wonderful to visit the Langwarrin Men's Shed in March. I was fortunate to see, among the many projects and activities underway, the recently completed refurbishment of 90 year old wooden park benches from Cruden Farm. Firstly, rather than simply throwing away these beautifully made pieces of history, the Men's Shed members had spent hours restoring them to their former glory for the public to enjoy for many years to come. And secondly — as part of Australian Men's Shed Association network — opening pathways of communication to improve men's mental health. The organisation's founding motto that "men don't talk face-to-face they talk shoulder to shoulder" is about providing local communities with a space for men to work and create those all-important connections. I am proud we host two of these facilities in Frankston City and show my support at every opportunity.

A fresh façade for key local buildings.

Our maintenance team has been working hard to create a fresh face for many Council and affiliated buildings across the city. Lyrebird and Langwarrin Community Centres and Seaford Lifesaving Club all received a brightening coat of paint. Likewise, in recent months Botany Park Preschool, Ballam Park Preschool and Bowerbird Preschool and many other Council-owned buildings, have all undergone external painting to complement the recently refurbished interiors.

You may have also noticed the Peninsula Aquatic Recreation Centre (PARC) is also undergoing a spruce up. Painting works to the upstairs gym, change rooms, reception and other key areas, as well as new flooring to replace the current tired and worn main entry, corridors and other thoroughfares will ensure the facility looks fresh and presentable for all users. Protective works to ensure the balance tank is structurally sound and safe for operation, installation of new lockers better suited to the aquatic environment and a new public address system are also nearing completion.

A funding boost for our growing city

I, along with many residents, was thrilled with the recent promise of much-needed \$30million in federal funding to upgrade various intersections along Ballarto Road, including Greenwood Drive, Dion Drive, Potts Road and elsewhere, which will improve traffic flow and safety in and around Ballarto Road. Residents of Skye, Sandhurst and Carrum Downs are becoming increasingly frustrated with heavily used roads, such as Hall Road in Skye, which no longer meet the needs of these rapidly growing suburbs. Council has been a long-term advocate for safer infrastructure in this congested area of Frankston City. We were vocal in our need for a safe pedestrian crossing in front of Skye Primary School a project that received funding from the Victorian Government last September, and we will continue to advocate for safer and functional facilities for our growing city.

Creating a sense of local pride

It is amazing what we can achieve when we all work together. It may seem a small thing, but the act of tidying up a front yard, trimming back overgrown trees, reducing clutter and otherwise making your house and street a welcoming space has many benefits to you and your neighbours. It not only increases property values and improves sustainability but sharing this sense of local pride with your neighbours creates connections proven to be good for mental health. A network of community members working together to improve where they live and providing invaluable services to each other — mowing a lawn, looking out for each other's children, passing on excess food or other goods — is so much better than individuals and families living in isolation. The emotional and financial benefits of the 'neighbour economy' are immense and immeasurable.

A revitalised netball facility for Langwarrin

Works commenced last month on the Langwarrin Netball Court redevelopment project, to significantly improve this facility for our local sporting clubs. The current four asphalt courts were in a terrible condition, to the point where they no longer complied with Netball Victoria standards. The revitalisation project will transform these courts over the coming months, including construction of a concrete warm up area, acrylic resurfacing, lighting facilities, fencing, drainage and other key features. Putting the spotlight on local sport

Our recent community consultation regarding upgrades to Frankston Park Oval lighting received significant and overwhelmingly positive interest from residents. I would like to thank everyone who contributed to this discussion while the project was still in concept phase. Your input has been invaluable to moving this project forward and we are excited to provide this new amenity for our local sporting clubs.

Upgrades will include installation of 300 to 360 LED light fittings, installed across four, 48 metre high light towers and new LED light fittings on grandstand and function centre buildings. These upgrades will create broadcast quality lighting at the oval, enabling AFLW, AFLX and VFL games to be televised from the ground and promoting Frankston as a local sporting hub.

Works are expected to commence in August and we are excited to be delivering such an important project for Frankston Football Club, players and fans.

These works coincide with other improvements underway at key sporting facilities in the area, including Ballam Park South and Overport Park. Both of these projects will create an environment for local sporting enthusiasts that is welcoming, inclusive and allows them to be the best they can be.



Roads to Recovery funding improving local roads

Council's partnership with the Federal Government to help deliver the Roads to Recovery Program has helped to make one of our local streets safer and more accessible, having recently completed upgrade works in Kars Street, Frankston South with \$110,000 in program funds. Creating our Reconciliation Action Plan

On 13 June 2017, I introduced a Notice of Motion to the Council for the introduction and implementation of Frankston City's inaugural Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP), which received unanimous endorsement from Councillors. It is with great pleasure that I can report that almost two years later, the plan development is progressing and has been included as an action in the Council endorsed Year 2 Action Plan for the Municipal Health and Wellbeing Plan 2017-2021.

The RAP will be a strategic document that supports Council's corporate plan, providing a framework for reconciliation. It will include practical actions that will drive Council's contribution to reconciliation both internally and in the communities in which Council operates and create meaningful opportunities with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples.

N'arweet Carolyn Briggs has a long history of association with Frankston and it is my understanding that her sister started the very first Indigenous girls' school in Victoria within our municipality. Frankston and Langwarrin, having retained large areas of native vegetation, are more reminiscent of the land of the traditional custodians than most other areas within their country. Expanding on this knowledge and learning about cultural heritage is imperative, in my view, not only to Frankston's identity, but also for recognising the reality of our colonial history.

Reconciliation Action Week occurs annually from 27 May until 3 June and the theme for the 2019 campaign is 'Grounded in Truth. Walk Together with Courage'.

At the heart of reconciliation is the relationship between the broader Australian community and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. The RAP being implemented by Council is a first step in a longer journey of fostering positive relations, grounded in a foundation of truth.

In the words of Reconciliation Australia, "Whether you're engaging in challenging conversations or unlearning and relearning what you know, this journey requires all of us to walk together with courage".

Our purpose is to inspire and enable all members of the municipality to contribute to the reconciliation of the nation.

Food safety and security

Council is always vigilant about food safety, with strict regulations for local food businesses. We constantly review these processes and introduce new ones, to ensure residents remain safe. For instance, we recently wrote to well over 500 businesses throughout the municipality reminding them of their responsibilities and of potential fines if they do not comply. Council is also now supplied with a list of local eateries in breach of food safety regulations and, for the public, a link on our website to the Victorian Department of Health's register of convicted businesses. Likewise, \$25,000 was budgeted for Friends of the Downs Estate, Seaford, to work with The University of Melbourne, to confirm the estate's suitability as a food security demonstration site. I have been asked by many people about road works along the lower portion of Skye and McMahons roads. Extending Orwil Street Community House

I am excited to announce we are currently finalising concepts for a \$700,000 redevelopment of Orwil Street Community House. Designs should be finalised by July, with construction planned for Financial Year 2019-2020. The revitalised community house will include larger community and meeting room spaces, additional counselling rooms, updated kitchen and amenities, a new computer room and additional storage spaces. The service, located in Frankston, is an important one for our community. It offers many low cost activities and is a welcoming and inclusive space for everyone to enjoy. Our investment in Orwil Street Community House reflects the importance we place on creating and enhancing spaces for people to connect within Frankston City.

Regional tennis and gymnastics centre at Centenary Park

As we welcome the vital redevelopment of Frankston Hospital supported by the Victorian Government, this exciting project has also raised issues for a local sporting club that we are keen to address. The hospital redevelopment and expansion requires the land adjacent to the hospital —currently home to the Frankston Tennis Club. This means the club and its 300+ members face potential closure if they don't find a new home. Council has developed a solution, which will relocate the club and merge it with the Frankston East Tennis Club at a new facility in Centenary Park. The facility will also cater for gymnastics, with the Bayside Gymnastics Club to relocate from its temporary home at a local primary school. This is great news for the two tennis clubs involved and will be a much-needed show of support for Bayside, which has operated under less than ideal conditions for some time. The purpose-built Centenary Park facility will provide a dedicated 1,500sqm gymnastics hall and training pit, 500 retractable spectator seating overlooking the gymnasium. It will also include 16 tennis hard courts including four that meet International Tennis Federation standards and four hot shot courts for junior tennis development. The facility includes many other incredible amenities that can help us to show these clubs we support and value their contribution to local sport. Council has already committed \$11 million to deliver this project, however it needs equal contributions of \$8.05 million from state and federal governments to proceed. We will continue advocating to deliver this vital project. For more information visit:

Recycling services continue as normal

Unlike other affected neighbouring municipalities, Council's household and public recycling collections will continue, as Frankston City was not affected by the temporary shutdown of some SKM recycling sorting facilities.

We currently collect 550-600 tonnes of recyclables each fortnight, for processing by Polytrade.

Recycling sorting facilities, also known as Material Recovery Facilities,

are where the mixed recyclables get sorted into different streams (such as aluminium, steel, paper/cardboard, plastic and glass), and are then sent to different markets for recycling. Please remember to rinse containers before placing them in recycling bins, to reduce contamination. To save drinking water, rinse items in left over washing up water.

Stay out of hot water with rebates up to \$1,000

The Victorian Government's Solar Homes Package is still available, providing rebates of up to \$1,000 for solar hot water systems installed between 19 August 2018 and 30 June 2019.

This is a great option for households where solar panels might not be suitable, or for households that already have solar panels installed.

As part of the package, rebates for solar PV systems are also available, up to a maximum of \$2,225 (equivalent to 50% off the cost of a 4 kilowatt solar



panel system). Both rebates are available until 30 June 2019, however households can only access one rebate type. For more information visit: solar.vic.gov.au

Hundreds come from far and wide for home detox event

Hundreds of people attended Sustainability Victoria's Detox Your Home service in Skye on Saturday 2 February, including residents from council's across Melbourne.

The Frankston City collection proved extremely popular, with 326 households disposing of an incredible 6,803 kilos of hazardous chemicals. The number of people utilising the service was up 45 per cent on last year's figures, with 64 per cent being first-timers.

Sustainability Victoria is partnering with a number of councils to ensure the safe disposal of household chemicals over the coming months, however many residents chose to travel long distances to utilise the Skye service in February.

"(Detox Your Home) was very well organised. I am so grateful to get rid of the stuff, it worried me for years. I drove an hour and a half to get there! A great sense of relief as I left," one householder from outside the municipality commented.

The service allowed householders to drop off hard to dispose of, and often dangerous household chemicals such as fire extinguishers, fertilisers and brake fluids, which can't be disposed of in regular rubbish or hard waste collections.

Council to compost your food scraps

At the 1 April Ordinary Council Meeting, Council voted to introduce a food waste kerbside collection, to start in October this year.

When the service begins in October, residents with a garden organics bin will be able to include food waste along with their garden waste.

Frankston City is an early adopter of the composting scheme alongside Councils like Bass Coast Shire and Glen Eira City

Council, who have seen a significant increase in household waste diverted from landfill. Garden organic waste bins will remain on a fortnightly collection schedule and will continue to be taken to a composting facility near Sale.

As part of this service a kitchen caddie and/or a roll of compostable bags will be available for residents with a garden organics service. More information on the new collection will be provided over the coming months.
